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THREE LESSONS FROM LOURDES

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"Drink from the spring and wash in it," said the beautiful Lady. At her command Bernadette Soubirous, the little shepherdess of Lourdes, looked around for a spring. There wasn't one. So she scratched at the loose gravel. Then from the murky water that appeared she first drank and then washed her face. She must have looked ridiculous. But in the following days the puddle became running water and then a stream. Since that day in 1858 countless pilgrims have bathed in and been healed by the waters of that spring. These waters and their healing power (sixty-nine documented miracles) are some of the most immediate and enduring fruits of our Lady's appearance at Lourdes.

So it is somewhat ironic that we observe the World Day of the Sick today, on the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. After all, her apparitions are more renowned for healing than sickness! Likewise, there is an irony in the fact that Bernadette herself never benefitted from the healing waters she had uncovered. Always a sickly child, she was prevented from entering the Carmelites because of her weakness. Becoming a Sister of Charity instead, she died of tuberculosis at the young age of thirty-five. Nevertheless, the observation of the World Day of the Sick is well placed. Our Lady of Lourdes teaches – and Bernadette understood clearly – three lessons for the sick: presence, healing, and sacrifice.

First, presence. The first thing to note about our Lady's appearance at Lourdes is that she appeared. She was present to that ignorant, poor shepherd girl who considered herself so unworthy of the visitor that she dared not call her Mary but always "the beautiful lady." In the first apparition, nothing was said. Just Mary's presence – a loving smile, an approving look. Likewise in other apparitions, either little or nothing was said. Presence was enough. Our Lady's appearance in Lourdes is in the pattern of her Son's public ministry. The solicitude she shows by her presence reflects that of her Son. He always gravitated towards the suffering – the blind, the lame, the sick, and so on.

The sick suffer not only physically but also emotionally, in the thought that they have been forgotten, become useless or, worse, a burden. We all like visitors when we are sick. We welcome that reminder that we are not alone, forgotten, or a burden. Likewise, we visit the sick – yes, to do good things for them, as we are able – to assure them of our love by our presence. His simple presence gave expression of that divine solicitude and care. Our Lady's visit reminds us of that – and that we need to extend it.

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OVERVIEW FOR THE MONTH

The month of February is dedicated to the Holy Family. The church has seen fit to recall the example of the Holy Family for the emulation of the Christian family. This year the first thirteen days of February fall during the liturgical season known as Ordinary Time which is represented by the liturgical color green. Green, the symbol of hope, is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. The remaining days of February are the beginning of Lent. The liturgical color changes to purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.

Though the shortest month of the year, February is rich in Liturgical activity. It contains a feast (Presentation of our Lord) that bridges two other seasons (Christmas and Easter)! In addition, the faithful may receive in February two of the four major public sacramentals that the Church confers during the liturgical year: blessed candles and the blessing of throats. Ideally, the members of the domestic church should try to have the candles for their home altar blessed on Candlemas Day (February 2nd); and the next morning, on the Feast of Saint Blaise, all might receive the blessing of the throats.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE MONTH

SAINT BLAISE

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As a child, I remember having my throat blessed on the feast of Saint Blaise. I was never too sure who he was or why we did this. Also, it seems like the practice has been forgotten.



Unfortunately, what is known about the life of Saint Blaise derives from various traditions. His feast day is celebrated in the East on February 11 and in the West on February 3 (although it was observed on February 15 until the 11th century). All sources agree that Saint Blaise was the Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia who suffered martyrdom under Licinius about AD 316. (Remember that Emperor Constantine had legalized the practice of Christianity in 313, but

Licinius, his ally and co-emperor who had concurred in legalizing Christianity, betrayed him and began persecuting the Church. Constantine defeated Licinius in 324.) From here, we rely on the tradition which has been associated with our liturgical celebrations over the centuries, which does not necessarily demean their veracity or accuracy.

In accord with various traditions, Saint Blaise was born to rich and noble parents and received a Christian education. He was a physician before being consecrated a bishop at a young age. Although such a statement seems terse, keep in mind that at that time the local community usually nominated a man to be a bishop based on his outstanding holiness and leadership qualities; he in turn was then examined and consecrated by other bishops with the approval of the Holy Father. Therefore, Saint Blaise must have been a great witness of our faith to say the least.

During the persecution of Licinius, Saint Blaise, receiving a divine command, moved from the town and lived as a hermit in a cave. Wild animals visited him and he healed any that were sick and wounded. One day, a group of hunters gathering wild beasts for the games in the amphitheater discovered Saint Blaise and seized him. As he was being taken to the governor Agricolaus, the governor of Cappadocia and Lesser Armenia, Saint Blaise encountered a woman whose pig was being seized by a wolf; Saint Blaise commanded the wolf to release the pig and it was freed unhurt.

While in prison, he miraculously cured a small boy who was choking to death on a fishbone lodged in his throat. Also, the woman whose pig had been saved brought Saint Blaise candles so that his cell would have light and he could read the sacred Scriptures.

Eventually, Agricolaus condemned Saint Blaise for upholding his Christian faith rather than apostatizing. He was tortured with an iron comb (an instrument designed for combing wool but was used here for shredding the skin) and finally beheaded.

By the sixth century, Saint Blaise's intercession was invoked in the East for diseases of the throat. As early as the eighth century, records attest to the veneration of Saint Blaise in Europe, and he became one of the most popular saints in the spiritual life of the Middle Ages. Many altars were dedicated to his honor. The Abbey of Saint Blaise in southern Germany even claimed to have some of his relics.

Saint Blaise is also venerated as one of the "Fourteen Holy Helpers," a group of saints invoked as early as the 12th century in Germany and who are honored on August 8: Saint Denis of Paris (headache and rabies); Saint Erasmus or Elmo (colic and cramp); Saint Blaise (throat ailments); Saint Barbara (lightning, fire, explosion, and sudden and unprepared death); Saint Margaret (possession and pregnancy); St. Catherine of Alexandria (philosophers and students, and wheelwrights); Saint George (protector of soldiers); Saints Achatius and Eustace (hunters); Saint Pantaleon (tuberculosis); Saint Giles (epilepsy, insanity and sterility); Saint Cyriac (demonic possession); Saint Vitus (epilepsy); and Saint Christopher (travelers). The German Dominicans promoted this veneration, particularly at the Church of Saint Blaise in Regensburg (c. 1320).

One reason for Saint Blaise's popularity arose from the fact he was a physician who cured, even performing miraculous cures. Thereby, those who were sick, especially with throat ailments, invoked his intercession. Eventually the custom of the blessing of throats arose, whereby the priest held two crossed candles over the heads of the faithful or touched their throats with them while he invoked the prayer of the saint and imparted God's blessing. In our present Roman Ritual, the priest prays, "Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." This practice continues in many parishes on Saint Blaise's feast day.

"Dust thou art, and into dust thou shalt return." Gn. 3:19

Rend your hearts, not your garments, and return to the Lord, your God. (Joel 2:13)

REFLECTION

The liturgical use of ashes originated in the Old Testament times. Ashes symbolized mourning, mortality and penance. In the Book of Esther, Mordecai put on sackcloth and ashes when he heard of the decree of King Ahasuerus to kill all of the Jewish people in the Persian Empire (Esther 4:1). Job repented in sackcloth and ashes (Job 42:6). Prophesying the Babylonian captivity of Jerusalem, Daniel wrote, "I turned to the Lord God, pleading in earnest prayer, with fasting, sackcloth, and ashes" (Daniel 9:3). Jesus made reference to ashes, "If the miracles worked in you had taken place in Tyre and Sidon, they would have reformed in sackcloth and ashes long ago" (Matthew 11:21).

In the Middle Ages, the priest would bless the dying person with holy water, saying, "Remember that thou art dust and to dust thou shalt return." The Church adapted the use of ashes to mark the beginning of the penitential season of Lent, when we remember our mortality and mourn for our sins. In our present liturgy for Ash Wednesday, we use ashes made from the burned palm branches distributed on the Palm Sunday of the previous year. The priest blesses the ashes and imposes them on the foreheads of the faithful, making the sign of the cross and saying, "Remember, man you are dust and to dust you shall return," or "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." As we begin this holy season of Lent in preparation for Easter, we must remember the significance of the ashes we have received: We mourn and do penance for our sins. We again convert our hearts to the Lord, who suffered, died, and rose for our salvation. We renew the promises made at our baptism, when we died to an old life and rose to a new life with Christ. Finally, mindful that the kingdom of this world passes away, we strive to live the kingdom of God now and look forward to its fulfillment in heaven.

LENTEN QUESTION

Q: WHAT IS LENT?

A: Lent is the forty day period before Easter, excluding Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday (the day before Easter Sunday). [This traditional enumeration does not precisely coincide with the calendar according to the liturgical reform. In order to give special prominence to the Sacred Triduum (Mass of the Lord's Supper, Good Friday, Easter Vigil) the current calendar counts Lent as only from Ash Wednesday to Holy

Thursday, up to the Mass of the Lord's Supper. Even so, Lenten practices are properly maintained up to the Easter Vigil, excluding Sundays, as before.]

LENTEN ACTION

Invite a non-practicing friend to Mass with you.

Fasting and abstinence on Ash Wednesday

PRAYER

Almighty and everlasting God, you despise nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent. Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our brokenness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 15

REFLECTION

LENTEN QUESTION

Q: WHY ARE THE FORTY DAYS CALLED LENT?

A: They are called Lent because that is the Old English word for spring, the season of the year during which they fall. This is something unique to English. In almost all other languages its name is a derivative of the Latin term, or "the forty days."

LENTEN ACTION

Think of a person with whom you have a strained relationship and make some gesture toward improving that relationship.

PRAYER

Direct our actions, Lord, by your holy inspiration and carry them forward by your gracious help, that all our works may begin in you and by you be happily ended. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. Amen.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 16

This, rather, is the fasting that I wish: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; Setting free the oppressed. (Isaiah 58:6)

REFLECTION

We must always remember what God tells us in Scripture: "Even if a mother could forget the child in her womb" - something impossible, but even if she could forget - "I will never forget you." And so here I am talking with you. I want you to find the poor here, right in your own home first. And begin love there. Be that good news to your own people first. And find out about your next-door neighbors. Do you know who they are? I had the most extraordinary experience of love of neighbor with a Hindu family. A gentleman came to our house and said: "Mother Teresa, there is a family who has not eaten for so long. Do something." So I took some rice and went there immediately. And I saw the children - their eyes shining with hunger. I don't know if you have ever seen hunger. But I have seen it very often. And the mother of the family took the rice I gave her and went out. When she came back, I asked her: "Where did you go? What did you do?" And she gave me a very simple answer: "They are hungry also." What struck me was that she knew - and who are they? A Muslim family - and she knew. I didn't bring any more rice that evening because I wanted them, Hindus and Muslims, to enjoy the joy of sharing.

LENTEN QUESTION

Q: WHAT IS A DAY OF FAST AND ABSTINENCE?

A: Under current canon law in the Western Rite of the Church, a day of fast is one on which Catholics who are eighteen to sixty years old are required to keep a limited fast. In this country, one may eat a single, normal meal and have two snacks, so long as these snacks do not add up to a second meal. Children are not required to fast, but their parents must ensure they are properly educated in the spiritual practice of fasting. Those with medical conditions requiring a greater or more regular food intake can easily be dispensed from the requirement of fasting by their pastor. A day of abstinence is a day on which

Catholics fourteen years or older are required to abstain from eating meat (under the current discipline in America, fish, eggs, milk products, and condiments or foods made using animal fat are permitted in the Western Rite of the Church, though not in the Eastern Rites.) Again, persons with special dietary needs can easily be dispensed by their pastor.

LENTEN ACTION

Schedule a fifteen minute period of silence today to listen to your heart and to the Lord speaking to you.

Abstinence from meat on all the Fridays of Lent.

PRAYER

Lord, with your loving care guide the penance we have begun. Help us to persevere with love and sincerity. Grant this through our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 17

If you bestow your bread on the hungry and satisfy the afflicted; Then light shall rise for you in the darkness. (Isaiah 58:10)

REFLECTION

"Repent, and believe in the gospel," Jesus told the crowds (Mark 1:15).

Perhaps at times we listen to sermons or read the gospels and apply the message to others. Often we can think of many people who need to repent. However we must be careful not to apply the gospel only to others. This call to repentance applies first of all to you and me. Recall that Jesus often preached in the synagogues and at the temple. He was preaching to the church goers and church workers. The call to repentance was not just to those sinners out there. The message of repentance is for Church leaders and workers. It is for you and me.

LENTEN QUESTION

Q: WHEN DOES LENT BEGIN?

A: Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which is the day on which the faithful have their foreheads signed with ashes in the form of a Cross. It is also a day of fast and abstinence.

LENTEN ACTION

Make a note on your calendar to participate in the Sacrament of Penance.

PRAYER

Father, look upon our weakness and reach out to help us with your loving power. Grant this through our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen. ☐

The Spiritual Army of God the Father celebrated the Feast of the Holy Infant Jesus on January 20, 2018 at the St. Francis de Sales Roman Catholic Church in Las Vegas, NV. Prior to its celebration, a nine day novena that commenced on January 11 was privately prayed by the devotees.

The Liturgical celebration started with the entrance of the Holy Infant Jesus on a carousel decked with fresh red roses. As the Holy Infant Jesus was carried down the aisle, all the devotees stood up, raised their own Infant Jesus statues and swayed them up high to the Sto. Niño petition song. This was followed by floral offering and prayers to the Holy Infant Jesus. Liturgy of the Mass was celebrated, then the individual blessing of the Holy Infant Jesus statues and the children. Children were lectors, offerors and prayer leaders. Procession of the Infant Jesus from the church to the Monsignor Lavoy Hall followed where lunch was served. Dance petition and Sinulog were repeatedly danced. Children from Chino Hills and La Brea



performed for the Holy Infant Jesus.

The veneration and celebration of the Feast of the Holy Infant Jesus is a spiritual extension of Christmas and signals our journey to the approaching Lenten season. This devotion links its genesis to Infant Jesus from the Carmelite sisters dating back during the time of St. Teresa de Avila. The promise of the Infant Jesus in His apparition and locution states "the more you honor me the more I will bless you." The rest is history.

The image of Infant Jesus of Prague became an instrument to drive away evil spirits by other subjects during the reign of King Humabon and Queen Juana who used the image solely for her dance. This CELEBRATION became known as Sinulog to the Cebuanos and remains the theme of the celebration.

The Infant Jesus celebration of The Spiritual Army puts a little more faith-based tone by introducing a petition and thanksgiving song that focuses on honoring our Infant Jesus rather than an instrument of driving unsolicited spirits around. Every devotee of the Spiritual Army from Las Vegas and Los Angeles has in mind the impact of Sto. Niño in their lives as the song STO. NIÑO renders everyone in faithful awe. 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

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THREE LESSONS FROM LOURDES

Second, healing. In Lourdes' miraculous spring, our Lady reminds us of her Son's healing power. Saint Luke wrote of Him: "Everyone in the crowd sought to touch him because power came forth from him and healed them all." (Lk 6:19) That healing power continues to break into the world. Not every instance of healing is catalogued as a miracle or announced to the world. But every one of us can point to some recovery or healing that requires more than man's medicine to explain. Jesus continues to work little miracles of healing still. And He does so for the same reason as back then: not to entertain, not merely to astound, but to show that the kingdom of God has come upon the world.

Third, sacrifice. Our Lord did not heal everyone. Not everyone who prays for healing receives it. Not every visitor to Lourdes departs cured. This brings us to what are in many ways our Lord's greater gift and more profound miracle: the ability to suffer with Him – that is, to sacrifice.

Suffering is not optional in a fallen world. In our fallen human nature, the body tends inevitably toward death and the sufferings that announce it. Everyone suffers. How we respond to our suffering makes all the difference. We can and should use the natural, medical means at our disposal to bring about some cure and relieve our suffering. But we know that those are limited and cannot grant perfect or permanent relief.

Everyone suffers. But not everyone sacrifices. Suffering is the simple experience of physical illness, injury, disease, and so on. We all encounter that. Sacrifice, on the other hand, is the offering of this suffering in union with Christ. Saint Paul was the first to articulate this theology of suffering: "Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ on behalf of his body, which is the church." (Col 1:24)

What has come to be called "redemptive suffering" begins with the awareness that Christ suffered first and most of all, that all our suffering must be seen in light of His. Then we recall that He is present to us in our suffering such that He shares our suffering and we share His. He is not a mere observer but has drawn close, taken our suffering upon Himself, and remains with us in the midst of it. Finally, our suffering becomes a sacrifice when, conscious of this union with Him, we offer it to Him.

As Saint Paul told the Colossians that he offered his sufferings "for your sake," so also we should offer ours for specific intentions. As He hung upon the Cross, enduring the extreme of suffering, our Lord saw each and every one of us . . . every struggle. . . every wound. . . every hurt. . . every need. . . and He offered His sufferings for us. Attaching to our offering a particular person, group, or

situation helps to give meaning to our suffering and to unite it more perfectly to His. When we do so our suffering ceases to be merely that and becomes through, with, and in Christ an offering to the Father. ◻

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OVERVIEW OF THE MONTH

The Solemnity of the Presentation of the Lord on February 2nd harkens back to the Christmas mystery of Light except that now, Christ, the helpless babe, is "the Light of Revelation to the Gentiles who will save his people from their sins." Candles, symbolizing Christ our Light, will be carried in procession this day, as will be the Paschal candle during the Easter Vigil Liturgy.

"The Light of Revelation" shines more brightly with each successive Sunday of Ordinary Time, until its magnificence – exposing our sinfulness and need for conversion – propels us into the penitential Season of Lent. We prepare to accept the cross of blessed ashes on Ash Wednesday (February 14) and plunge ourselves into anticipating the major exercises of Lent – fasting, prayer, almsgiving – laying our thoughts and prayers on the heart of our Mother Mary. She, who offered her Son in the temple and on the Cross, will teach us how to deny ourselves, take up our cross daily, and follow after her Son. ◻

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SAINT BLAISE

While we invoke Saint Blaise for his protection against any physical ailment of the throat, we should also ask his protection against any spiritual ailment – profanity, cursing, unkind remarks, detraction or gossip. St. James reminds us, "If a man who does not control his tongue imagines that he is devout, he is self-deceived; his worship is pointless" (1:26); and later, "We use [the tongue] to say, 'Praise be the Lord and Father'; then we use it to curse men, though they are made in the likeness of God. Blessing and curse come out of the same mouth. This ought not to be, my brothers!" (3:9-10). Therefore, may Saint Blaise protect us from all evil, physical and spiritual, which may attack the throat. ◻
