CONSECRATION AND FEAST DAY OF THE FATHER OF ALL MANKIND - AUGUST 2, 2015

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Returning to the House of God our Father. The Roman Catholic Church defines God as the three Persons of the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. However, since the earliest beginnings of the Church, there has been a tendency to focus primarily on the Second Person of the Holy Trinity – Jesus, the Son of God. And to a lesser extent, there has been renewed interest in the Holy Spirit in the latter half of the 20th century. But what of the Father?

True, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is offered up to God Our Father and the “Our Father Prayer” is directed to Him. But do we “know” the Father? Do we believe that when Jesus came to earth as the Incarnation of God, that we no longer needed to know, love, serve or honor the Father? Do we think that Jesus replaced the Father? Do we feel that God Our Father belongs to the Old Testament era and Jesus belongs to the New Testament times? Do we perceive God Our



Father as an ancient, mythic figure that is stern, aged, and unapproachable? Do we truly know Him? Love Him? Serve Him? Honor Him? The response to these questions by most Catholics would indicate that, indeed, something is seriously lacking in our perception and relationship with God Our Father.

Think for a moment. Do we typically see statues or paintings of the Father in our Catholic churches? Are any of our churches named in honor of Him? Does the Catholic Church have any special feasts that specifically honor Him? The answer, unfortunately, is “No!”

Why don’t we honor our Creator, Our Father – especially with a feast? This is an unsettling question and a disturbing revelation, but it is also something we can easily remedy. As children of God Our Father, we can work towards establishing a feast for Him – a feast that would provide us with an opportunity to offer our fiat. Holy Scripture provides us with a blueprint for such a feast as was foreshadowed in the Feasts of Tabernacles [Booths] and Dedication (Lev 23:33-43; 2 Chron 7:1-9; 1 Mac 4:59; 2 Mac 2:1-18). Both eighth-day period, or “octave.” It would be, then a Holy Octave of Consecration to God Our Father with its solemn eight day celebrated as The Feast Day of the Father of All Mankind.

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OVERVIEW FOR THE MONTH

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The month of August is dedicated to The Immaculate Heart of Mary. The entire month falls within the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. It is used in the offices and Masses of Ordinary Time. The last portion of the liturgical year represents the time of our pilgrimage to heaven during which we hope for reward.

August is often considered the transitional month in our seasonal calendar. It is the time of the year we begin to

wind-down from our summer travels and vacations and prepare for Autumn — back to school, fall festivals, harvest time, etc. The Church in her holy wisdom has provided a cycle of events in its liturgical year which allow the faithful to celebrate the major feasts in the life of Christ and Mary. Most notably, during August, we celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration (August 6) and the feast of the Assumption (August 15). . ❑

HIGHLIGHT OF THE MONTH

GOD THE FATHER'S PROVIDENTIAL LOVE

*St. Pope John Paul, II
General Audience – March 24, 1999*

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1. Continuing our meditation on God the Father, today we would like to reflect on his generous and providential love. "The witness of Scripture is unanimous that the solicitude of divine providence is concrete and immediate; God cares for all, from the least things to the great events of the world and its history" (CCC, n. 303). We can begin with a text from the Book of Wisdom, in which divine Providence is seen guiding a boat in the middle of the sea: "It is your Providence, O Father, that steers its course, because you have given it a path in the sea, and a safe way through the waves, showing that you can save from every danger, so that even if a man lacks skill, he may put to sea" (Wis 14:3-4).

In a psalm we find another image of the sea, ploughed by ships and teeming with animals large and small, which recalls the nourishment that God provides for all living things: "These all look to you, to give them their food in due season. When you give to them, they gather it up; when you open your hand, they are filled with good things" (Ps 104:27-28).

2. The image of the ship in the middle of the sea well describes our situation before our providential Father. He, as Jesus says, "makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust" (Mt 5:45). However, in the light of this message of the Father's providential love, we naturally wonder how suffering can be explained. And it is necessary to recognize that the problem of suffering is an enigma which perplexes human reason. Divine Revelation helps us understand that it is not willed by God, since it entered the world because of human sin (cf. Gn 3:16-19). "Almighty God ..., because he is supremely good, would never allow any evil whatsoever to exist in his works if he were not so all-powerful and good as to cause good to emerge from evil itself" (St Augustine, *Enchiridion de fide, spe et caritate*, 11, 3: PL 40, 236). In this regard, the reassuring words that Joseph spoke to his brothers, who had sold him and later depended on his power, are significant: "It was not you who sent me here but God.... As for you, you meant evil against me; but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today" (Gn 45:8; 50:20).

God's plans do not coincide with those of man; they are infinitely better, but often incomprehensible to the human mind. The Book of Proverbs says: "A man's steps are ordered by the Lord; how then can man understand his way?" (Prv 20:24). In the New Testament, Paul will

announce this consoling principle: "In everything God works for good with those who love him" (Rom 8:28).

3. What should be our attitude to God's providential and far-sighted action? We certainly should not wait passively for what he sends us, but cooperate with him in bringing to completion the work he has begun in us. We must be eager to seek first the things of heaven. These must come first, as Jesus said: "Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness" (Mt 6:33). Other matters must not be the object of excessive concern, because our heavenly Father knows our needs; this is what Jesus teaches us when he asks his disciples for "childlike abandonment to the providence of our heavenly Father who takes care of his children's smallest needs" (CCC, n. 305): "Do not seek what you are to eat and what you are to drink, nor be of anxious mind. For all the nations of the world seek these things; and your Father knows that you need them" (Lk 12:29f.).

We are therefore called to cooperate with God in an attitude of great trust. Jesus teaches us to ask the heavenly Father for our daily bread (cf. Mt 6:11; Lk 11:3). If we receive it with gratitude, we will also spontaneously remember that nothing belongs to us, and that we must be ready to give: "Give to everyone who begs from you; and of him who takes away your goods do not ask them again" (Lk 6:30).

4. The certainty that God loves us makes us trust in his fatherly providence even in life's most difficult moments. This complete trust in God, the providential Father, even in the midst of adversity, is admirably expressed by St Teresa of Jesus: "Let nothing trouble you; let nothing frighten you. Everything passes. God never changes. Patience obtains all. Whoever has God wants for nothing. God alone is enough" (Poems, 30).

Scripture offers us an eloquent example of total trust in God when it tells how Abraham reached the decision to sacrifice his son Isaac. In reality, God did not want the death of the son, but the faith of the father. And Abraham demonstrates it completely, for when Isaac asks him where the lamb is for the burnt offering, he dares to answer: "God will provide" (Gn 22:8). And then he immediately experiences the benevolent Providence of God, who saves the young boy and rewards his faith, filling him with blessings.

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GOD TOUCHED ME

ABBA FATHER! EXPERIENCING GOD'S LOVE

In the past, there were two persons of the Trinity whom I loved and experienced and prayed to -- the Son and the Holy Spirit. The Father, however, was always somewhere in the distance, a person I could not reach. I didn't feel I was worthy to reach him, nor did I believe that he had time for me.

Within this last year, however, I have found that the Father is not only approachable, but that he longs for a relationship with his sons and daughters. We must learn to accept that and to return his love. We have to understand how real he is, how passionately in love he is with his creation, how deeply he wants to have a personal relationship with us. The Father doesn't need this relationship, but we need it, and he wants it.

The reasons for my emotional distance from my God the Father are deep-seated. You see, I never knew my biological father as I was growing up. He was a bank robber in Indiana, and he was arrested and put in prison when I was only one week old. My mother remarried and I was given my stepfather's name: Sheire. My stepfather was a hardworking man, but unfortunately he was an alcoholic and abusive. Childhood for me was filled with many painful experiences of my stepfather; I never knew a father's love.

When I was about twenty years old, shortly after I got married, I saw my real father on television: He had become a Baptist missionary in South America. When I saw this preacher, I was amazed that he had the same name that I thought was my real name, Harold Robert Holfinger. Back in those days, television was live, so I called the station and asked to speak to the minister. He was still there, and I asked him: "Do you have two sons by the name of Louis and Bob?" There was a long silence. Then he asked me who I was. I said, "I'm Bob." He answered, "Well, I'm your father."

Searching for Fatherly Love

I met with my real father a couple of times, but didn't actively pursue a relationship with him because my stepfather was still alive. As bad as that relationship was, I felt a loyalty to him because he had put a roof over my head and food on the table. But after my stepfather died, I began to see my biological father on a regular basis. We were able to establish a good relationship, but the anger

and pain about his having abandoned me still remained. Fatherly love still seemed to be eluding me.

As my wife and I grew in our relationship, I became a father myself -- in fact, the father of eight children over the next twelve years. I always tried to be a good father and I grew closer to the church -- but there was a void in my life. Because I had never known a father's love, it was difficult for me to love my children. Looking back now, I can see the many times when I failed my children. Even so, the Lord was watching over them because they have all grown up to be fine adults.

As the children got older, my wife and I had more time to seek the wonderful things that the church had to offer. About a year ago, a number of my friends attended a conference that focused on the Father's love. I was not able to go, but I asked them to bring back tapes of the talks so I could listen and pray about what I heard. As I spent time with those tapes, praying and studying scripture, I asked the Father to reveal to me how much he loved me, because I desperately needed to know the love of a father. During one particular time of prayer, God did reveal his deep love for me; it was probably the most wonderful experience of my sixty-three years of life. I came to understand how wonderfully the Father loved me, how much he cared for me -- even that he was my Daddy. I felt that I was being cradled in his arms, sitting on his lap like a beloved child. I felt as if all of the fatherly love that had been denied me over the years was poured into me in a few hours' time.

Running Into Our Father's Arms

When we are small children, we run eagerly to our daddies. What joy we feel as we are received by them! They raise you up, lift you high, and bounce you on their knees. That is what I experienced with my heavenly Father. It was simply acceptance -- what I had always wanted from a father and very seldom received. Many of us have experienced times when we needed our fathers but they were not there for us, perhaps through no fault of their own. I've never experienced that loss with my heavenly Father; his love is constant. Over this past year, whenever I have felt unhappy, I turn to him and he pours out his mercies and blessings.

THE POWER OF SILENT PRAYER

For years I've been trying to master the art of silent prayer. Sometimes my attempts find me staring at my shoes, thinking about the work I need to be doing. Other times, when I approach prayer with an open heart, I can feel my life, attitude, and perspective changing with every second I keep my eyes closed.

Silence is difficult. It's confusing. What, exactly, is supposed to happen while sitting for long, potentially awkward periods of time? I'm still not confident about my answer, but I can share some of my experiences.

Enough is enough. First, every time I enter into silent prayer it takes quite a while to get situated. I'm thinking about the endless number of tasks that need to be done at my job and my apartment. Moreover, I have special projects, blog posts, videos, and, most importantly, people I need to connect with throughout the day. My mind never shuts off, unless I put my foot down and say, enough is enough. Entering into silent prayer takes work. It takes discipline and courage to cut through all the little things that distract our minds and hearts to arrive at a sacred and productive silence.

I have some good days and I have some terrible days when I attempt to enter into silent prayer. However, the more I try, the better I get.

I am not in charge. When I'm at my best in silent prayer, I get an overwhelming feeling that I am not in charge. While that sounds cliché, it seems to me that this simple mindset is the remedy to my stress, heartache, and anxiety. Day to day I get tricked into believing that my daily tasks, obstacles, and struggles are bigger than they are. Some days I even feel cheated that people don't recognize them or validate them, but my prayer puts things into the proper perspective. I get a profound sense that God is in charge and that life is mysterious. And no matter what struggles come my way, God has a way to redeem them. I like to think that I trust God, but silence helps me to live that trust.

Deeper prayer. God isn't some "thing" we can quantify; God is mystery. Silence is one of the most profound ways to dive deeper into the mystery that is God. I've grown to appreciate this idea through St. Ignatius's spiritual exercises. For 30 weeks I was asked to sit in silence for one hour a day while using my imagination to contemplate the scriptures. I was hesitant at first, but it made sense that if God worked through all things (a very basic and popular Ignatian concept), God certainly worked through my imagination.

It was then that I realized the true beauty of silent prayer. Every week I was given a set of bible verses to

contemplate. More than that, I was asked to imagine myself within the bible stories. It was there that I "met" God for the first time. He revealed himself to me in a number of creative ways that made me seek God more, ways that fueled my desire to know God more deeply.

Ironically, my silent prayer was incredibly loud, interactive, and engaging. It was also emotional and intimate. The silence allowed God to speak to my heart in mysterious ways. Through those 30 weeks of the spiritual exercises, I interacted with God in ways that I never thought possible. We shared intimate moments and furthered our relationship. In my scripture contemplations, Jesus treated me as one of his disciples and entrusted me with tasks to further his mission. He trusted me. He embraced me. He stuck up for me. He loved me. The silence was a sacred space for me to be with Jesus.

For me, this is the power of silent prayer: it creates a deeper relationship with an infinite and mysterious God. It takes us down a path that ultimately leads to a deep friendship. □

Such texts must be interpreted, then, in the light of Revelation as a whole, which reaches its fullness in Jesus Christ. He teaches us to place great confidence in God even in the most difficult moments: nailed to the Cross, Jesus abandons himself totally to the Father: "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit" (Lk 23:46). With this attitude he raises to a sublime level what Job had summed up in his famous words: "The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord" (Jb 1:21). Even what is humanly a misfortune can be part of that great plan of infinite love in which the Father provides for our salvation. □

CONSECRATION AND FEAST DAY OF THE FATHER OF ALL MANKIND

The Holy Octave of Consecration to God Our Father and its Feast of the Father of All Mankind would integrate the purpose and meaning of both the previous Old Testament feasts in its focus on knowing, loving, serving and honoring God Our Father. Because of this, it would involve a commemoration of what God has done for His children and what we need to do for Our Father. With this feast, God would not only be present as He was in the Ark of the Covenant, in a stone temple, or in the tabernacle of a church – He would be housed and present in those souls who were purified and dedicated to Him through consecration.

What exactly is The Holy Octave of Consecration to God Our Father and its Feast of the Father of All Mankind? Its greatest significance in these times is that it provides us with an opportunity (1) to honor God Our Father, (2) to offer Him our “fiat,” and (3) to consecrate ourselves to Him. In this way, we are truly cooperating with our Mother Mary in the Triumph of Her Immaculate Heart. We are returning to Our Father; we are offering Him our unconditional “fiat” as Mary and Jesus did; and we are consecrating ourselves to Him – totally. As He so richly deserves, we are finally knowing, loving, serving, and honoring Him as God Our Father – the Father of All Mankind.

Consecrating Ourselves To God Our Father. The most compelling precedent for consecrating ourselves to God Our Father over an eight-day feast, or octave, is found in John 10:22-39. This passage describes how Jesus during the eight-day Feast of Dedication, revealed that He was consecrated to God Our Father.

Jesus further explains that He consecrated Himself to Our Father so we, too, could be consecrated in truth (Jn 17:19-21). The concept of “Consecration to God Our Father” is crucial because, as Jesus tells us, “the hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for such the Father seeks to worship him. God is a spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth” (Jn 4:23-24). If we follow Jesus, if we model ourselves after Him, shouldn't we also consecrate ourselves to God Our Father during an eight-day feast, so that we, too, can adore Him “in spirit and in truth?”

If we choose to consecrate ourselves to God Our Father, how should this be done? The concept of an “octave,” or 8-day feast, has been significant in our relationship with God since the beginning of our Salvation History. It is not by coincidence that Jesus chose to reveal His consecration to God Our Father on the eight-day Feast of Dedication.

Unlike other feasts and consecration methods, The Holy Octave of Consecration to God Our Father views the “big

picture” of our Salvation History. It involves the entire process of our spiritual journey which includes Mary, our Mother; Jesus, our God and our Savior; and the Holy Spirit, our God and our Sanctifier – with progression always toward God Our Father.

God's Word in both the Old and New Testaments provides us with extensive Scriptural support for an eight-day or “octave,” format. From the Book of Genesis to the Gospels and Epistles, the number “eight” is used to signify salvation, covenant, purification, and dedication. Perhaps, more importantly, it is used to indicate the end of one era and the beginning of another in which God is revealed, manifested, and present to His children in a new way.

The Holy Octave of Consecration to God Our Father, in its most powerful form, is intended as a formal eight-day feast for God Our Father culminating on the first Sunday of the “eighth” month, God Our Father's Month – August. The solemn eighth day of the Holy Octave of Consecration to God Our Father would be celebrated under the title of The Feast of the Father of All Mankind. However, consecration to God Our Father using the eight-day formula of The Holy Octave of Consecration to God Our Father can be done informally at any time during the year. □

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ABBA FATHER!

In my case -- and I'm sure I'm not alone in this -- my relationships with my father and my stepfather were so flawed that I looked at God the Father in fear. I was unsure that he was capable of giving me any more love than they had. Praise God, the Father has no flaws in his love. There are no strings attached. His love is unconditional. He says: “I love you; I created you; my Son Jesus died for you; our relationship is secure.” And that is the difference.

I can now see that my fatherly love for my children was often conditional. I loved them more when they were good than I did when they were not good, more when they obeyed than when they disobeyed. My children are now in their 30's and 40's, but it's not too late. I am trying to reflect the compassionate love of the Father to my children, to have more compassion for them. I hope that, in time, this will enable them to experience the Father's love as I have experienced it.

I have forgiven my biological father and I have also forgiven my stepfather. But this could not happen until I had come to know my heavenly Father's love. I hold no anger toward either man. I can't hold anger against anybody, because the Father holds no anger against me. During my initial experience of coming to know the Father's love, I felt him reassuring me that I would never be angry with anyone again. Even though I can be very hotheaded at times, since that time a year ago, I have

not been angry with anyone. God healed me tremendously in that regard.

I've always known that Jesus loved me because he died on the cross for me; he poured out his precious blood for me. I've understood that, and I've experienced the presence of Jesus in my life. Yet when I asked the Father to come into my life, it was an even greater experience. Jesus is the Father's Son, and I am the Father's son. I am a brother to Jesus, and that same love and compassion that the Father has for his Son Jesus, he has for me. It's hard to comprehend that with all the billions of people in the world, the Father is so intimately in love with each and every one of us. But we have to understand that this is the nature of our Father's heart. ☐

"MORE THAN ONCE" — Luke 11:5-6

Then Jesus said to them, "Suppose one of you went to your friend's house very late at night and said to him, 'A friend of mine has come into town to visit me. But I have nothing for him to eat. Please give me three loaves of bread.'

KEY THOUGHT:

Jesus didn't just teach about prayer once, but many times. Jesus didn't pray just once, but consistently went to his Father in prayer. Prayer is not something that we master, but a grace by which God gains mastery over our hearts. So Jesus stressed its importance, demonstrated his dependence upon it, and often made it the subject of his teaching. Here, to emphasize the importance of persistence, he uses an illustration from the real world in which they lived. This not only made his teaching memorable, but anchored the importance and meaning of prayer in real, everyday living.

TODAY'S PRAYER:

Father, thank you for Jesus' repeated emphasis on the importance of prayer, both in his teaching and with his example. Teach me to value prayer the way your Son did. Give me daily reminders of prayer's importance to me and to you. In Jesus' name I pray. Amen.

Flora called me to say that the x-ray taken in preparation for the pin insertion showed no break in her wrist! She and I believe this is miraculous. The doctor said the earlier x-ray was a mis-read.
